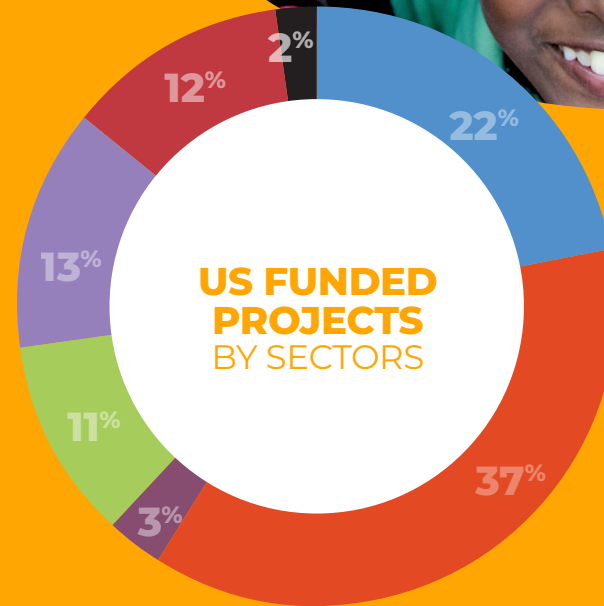

2019 AT A GLANCE

Last year, thanks to our generous donors, sponsors, and volunteers, VFF USA supported 18 key projects benefiting over 8,500 people in rural India. Some of the larger projects included water purification unit and water access in Gundigalipalli, hospital equipment for Bathalapalli Hospital, and

nutrition support in Adoni Region. We have almost doubled the number of sponsored children (currently, 62), while continuing to support rural women through our women's empowerment initiative. Overall, since 2013, over 700 individuals and organizations have supported VFF USA's work.

The Gala, held at the Capital Hilton in Washington, featured a delicious mix of Spanish, Indian and American cuisines, while bringing together a diverse and intimate group of VFF USA’s supporters from the Greater DC area, NYC, Anantapur and Barcelona.

The evening of culinary masterpieces, authentic Indian and Spanish music, and vibrant holiday colors featured chef tasting stations, with chefs from Indique, Boqueria, RASA, Taberna del Alabardero, Indigo, Innovation Cuisine, and Xiquet. PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

EDUCATION FOR TRANSFORMATION:

How Child Sponsorship Transforms Families and Local Communities



In the rural regions of India, many children cannot finish school. Poor families lack sufficient food, clean water and proper health care, so children start working early to support their parents financially. In addition, some families force girls to marry early to reduce financial stress, so high school completion rates are still lower for girls than for boys.

VFF USA Sponsor a Child Program raises awareness about the importance of education to break the cycle of poverty. The program helps sponsored children to finish their education and is one of our key community development programs, as it supports not only the child, but also the whole community.

Many US sponsors appreciate the impact this program brings to local communities in rural India. Carlos is a veteran, author and impact investor with extensive senior public service experience in the Middle East, Asia, Latin America and Eastern Europe. He strongly believes in “the power of communities and education.” Carlos shared that “what Vicente Ferrer set up in India as a system to tackle the disparities of poverty is impressive.” Vanessa is an accomplished journalist who currently works in the Greater Washington, D.C. area. Vanessa shared, “Since I was a child, I learned from my parents that education and health were the most important heritage they could give me and my sister...so I was really lucky for that, and now I want to give that same heritage to other children who did not have this opportunity.”



HOW ONE BICYCLE CAN SIGNIFICANTLY INCREASE SCHOOL ENROLLMENT AND GRADUATION RATES

Providing access to high school education to rural children is one of the objectives of our organization. There are many remote villages in the Anantapur area which lack access to school buses, making it difficult for children from these areas to reach their schools. This creates a major challenge for continuity of education of rural students, especially for girls living in remote villages. To address this problem, we provide bicycles to rural children from economically disadvantaged and remote villages to get to their high schools, which are often located 2-8 km from their native villages. Our Bicycle Program improves attendance rates and academic performance. We provided 215 bicycles to students this year.



“I am a 7th grade student. Both of my parents depend on agriculture as their main occupation. I have a brother who studies in the 3rd grade and my sister is in the 6th grade. We do not have good transportation from our village.

Before I got my bicycle, I was not going to school on time. During the morning, it was difficult for me to get ready and for my parents to prepare my food for arriving to school at 8 am. But now I am very happy because the bicycle saves my journey time. I am able to get to school just in 20 to 30 minutes. I am able to reach home early in the evening and do my homework. My parents are also very happy.”

HOW PROFESSIONAL SCHOOL OF FOREIGN LANGUAGES IMPROVES NEW GRADUATES' EMPLOYABILITY

A majority of rural graduates from disadvantaged communities are unable to find good jobs in cities. The main challenge is that these graduates lack English language conversational and communication skills, soft skills, computer and basic accounting skills. To address this challenge, in 2012, Rural Development Trust (RDT), our local partner in India, started the Professional School of Foreign Languages which provides a wide variety of professional development courses. In fact, 60% to 75% of those who were trained in the professional school found a job placement six months after successful completion of their course. This year we funded a six-month course to improve English and professional development skills for 26 female students, including three girls with disabilities.

“Before joining this course, I didn't know how to speak in English fluently, how to communicate with others professionally and also informally. I felt fear and shyness. In this course I gave PowerPoint presentations and participated in group discussions. Thanks to the course, I improved my self-confidence and got a job where I can use the skills I learnt.”

PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

COMMUNITY HEALTH PROGRAM

Providing Supplementary Nutrition to Children and Mothers

RDT has been implementing Nutrition Projects for the past two decades to address challenges faced by rural communities. Recurring droughts in Anantapur intensify poverty conditions resulting in undernutrition and anemia. The Community Health Program provides access to supplementary nutrition for children (1-5 years) and pregnant and nursing mothers, but also to persons suffering from chronic sickness and seniors who lack family or community support. The main objective is to save lives and improve the health status of both children and mothers.

Bastion Life Foundation, one of our foundation partners, helped in addressing the Dhone area's nutritional needs. A total of 815 people spread across 29 villages of Dhone area, in the Adoni region of Kurnool district, have benefited from the program.

Shelter, Nutrition, Healthcare, Education, and Emotional Support for Orphans Living with HIV

In rural India, many children infected by HIV are orphaned and they are exposed to abuse, neglect, stigma, and discrimination. Many of them have no choice but go out on the street, where they are exposed to multiple threats and infections. To address this problem, RDT created an orphanage for children living with HIV.

This year, Sangeeta Prasad, one of our loyal donors, made a generous donation to support this orphanage. These funds helped provide orphaned children living with HIV with shelter, nutritional support, emotional and psychological care, and a proper education. The congenial atmosphere at the orphanage improves their quality of life and ensures that children reach their best potential.



RURAL HOSPITALS

People living in rural areas of India have limited access to healthcare facilities. There is a shortage of skilled labor and adequate public health infrastructure, and private hospitals are not affordable for them. RDT created a network of three hospitals to provide affordable and quality healthcare to rural communities. RDT Bathalapalli hospital includes the Hospital for Infectious Diseases (HID), which caters to the needs of individuals affected by HIV/AIDS and tuberculosis (TB). The hospital has been operational since 2006 and has become a referral center in South India. The hospital received 5,772 admissions in FY19 and 59,994 visits for consultation.

Thanks to several VFF USA donors, we funded new medical equipment for the RDT Bathalapalli Hospital, in order to provide quality and timely diagnostic services and treatment to the HIV/AIDS & TB patients. This has been an investment in the health and well-being of these communities, as India is still largely affected by TB. In 2017, 10 million people around the world were infected by TB, and one in four cases were diagnosed in India, affecting 2.7 million people.

HABITAT

The primary objective of the habitat program is to give people access to decent housing with sanitary facilities and to carry out necessary community infrastructure, such as water purification systems. This is crucial for overcoming social inequality. In rural India, many people belonging to disadvantaged communities live in small huts in precarious and unsanitary conditions. Huts don't have bathrooms, and open defecation is a significant health and safety challenge in rural communities. To support the most disadvantaged, the houses built by our local partner become the property of the women of the family or of a person with disabilities.

Anantapur District in Andhra Pradesh is one of India's driest regions. The Anantapur district receives the second-lowest rainfall in India, after Jaisalmer in Rajasthan. More than 90 percent of its drinking water supply

comes from groundwater. However, over the past twenty years, the water supply has dramatically reduced. Last summer, according to Indian Express, over 600 villages in the district faced acute water shortages. In addition, the ground water across Anantapur is contaminated with dangerously high levels of fluoride, which causes both dental fluorosis and deformed bones and joints. This problem can be resolved by use of reverse osmosis filter systems.

VFF USA, with the support of Vipin Desai, CEO of MVS Inc., funded the construction of a new water purification plant with reverse osmosis and the drilling of three new bore wells in Gundiganipalli village of Anantapur. This project helped deliver safe and affordable drinking water to 200 families, and even provided water for cattle in the village.

WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT

Supporting women entrepreneurs

Last year, VFF USA and RDT partnered with WHEELS Global Foundation to implement "RDT-on-WHEELS," a women's entrepreneurship project helping women artisans from the Chenchu tribe in Srisailam Region. Thanks to a generous grant from WHEELS, the new project is supporting sustainable livelihoods of Chenchu women through production and sale of cups and plates made from leaves, ultimately leading to their integrated development and empowerment.

Training Programs for Women

Thanks to VFF USA's generous donors, Durgavathi, a young woman from Bukkaraya Village, was able to learn tailoring skills. Today she is a successful tailor sharing her talent with the world. "Because of my disability, I used to be afraid of people...and now, thanks to this training program, I am free from fear and have a voice," shared Durgavathi.

"My name is Soni Bai, I'm 27 years old, and I studied until 10th grade. After my marriage, I stayed at home doing household work. I had a desire to learn any skill and to earn money from home, so I grabbed this opportunity when RDT provided this tailoring training. I am doing my tailoring work at my home, some of the villagers are giving me work now. Recently, due to COVID-19, the government and RDT approached us to produce masks. RDT provided a half-day training on stitching masks. At that training, we learnt cutting and stitching masks. They provided cloth and we stitched the masks at our homes. I earned 12,500 rupees per month through this work. It is a great opportunity for us to use our skills and earn some money from home. We are thankful to RDT and the donors based in the US for supporting women like me to improve my skills and develop our lives. Thanks to donors and RDT, I will always remember them in my life."

DISABILITY INCLUSIVE DEVELOPMENT

In rural India, people with disabilities still face numerous challenges, including discrimination and medical neglect. To address this challenge, we support educational programs focused on children with disabilities. RDT operates five primary and one secondary inclusive schools. Mr. Dasarath, Director for the Disability Inclusive Development Sector, said, “When we decided to build our first school, almost no one understood why we were investing in such a beautiful building to house and educate kids with various disabilities. Now this school brings the best out of children who didn’t have any hopes to succeed whatsoever.”

VFF USA has been fortunate to have many passionate donors. We are delighted to share that we have received a generous grant from an anonymous donor to supply various educational materials, including books, speech therapy kits, measuring instruments and other supplies for children with hearing loss and hearing impairment at the RDT Bukkaraya Primary Education School.
